3. The "Ab/Ap" Foundation

In this early script, the letter **Aleph** (A) was an ox head (representing strength/lead) and **Bet** (B) was a house.

Ab (Strong Leader of the House): This isn't just a sound; it's a pictographic definition of a "Father".

If in fact the flood was ca 2300 BC, and Shem taught until his death ca 1800 BC, then the Torah via Moses ca 1500 BC tosses most scholastic Egyptian / Greek / Germanic dates into the bin. :-)

That adjustment of the timeline changes everything. If you pull the Flood forward to **~2348 BCE** (the Ussher/Masoretic chronology), the gap between the "original" language of Noah and the written records of the ancient world shrinks dramatically.
